Train Depot

The photo is of the office of the Chicago & Northwestern Railway Company located in Belvidere, early 20th century. This office was shown when railroads in the area were used for the passenger service that they exclusively provided, which is not the case today. Cultural norms do change from one age to another, and today our cultural norms are different from those in place at the end of the Nineteenth Century.

Freight traffic to and from the Fiat Chrysler Plant is still essential, but today, a passenger train from Belvidere would be impractical, because it would offer infrequent service and only go to one place: Union Station in Downtown Chicago. This would not provide convenient service to O'Hare Airport or many other popular Chicago-area destinations.

Today, Interstate 90, with the latest in improvements, is the preferred route for intercity passenger transportation. Mass transit can be more efficiently provided and at much less expense and with more comfort by bus, perhaps as frequently as hourly from convenient roadside locations like the Belvidere Oasis or Lyford Station in Rockford. With Interstate 90 buses using a private lane in heavy traffic, and with direct connections to the CTA and Pace buses, the speed, flexibility and cost make train commuting non-competitive.

Unfortunately, politicians have shamelessly used the promise of mass transit by train as a tool to sentimentally manipulate their constituents, never intending to follow through. This side-show distracts from the importance of providing Belvidere with viable, intercity passenger transportation and the economic prosperity it would bring.

This photograph was shot at what was likely the start of the day for these workers. It is uncertain if the workers began their day at 9 AM, but the clock registers 9:03, and it looks to be day time. Even today the remnants of the former Chicago & Northwestern Railway and most current railroad companies have workers reporting around the clock and around the calendar.

Office work in the early 20th Century saw more and more women employed. Office work, bookkeeping and stenographic work were job assignments often given to women. Through the 1960s, 1970s and today, our culture has vocally noted that women workers often are not granted the same level of pay and responsibility as men working similar jobs. As the office became receptive to women working beside men, entirely new areas of work, previously denied to women, became available.

The woman shown on the right could have been a secretary, or perhaps a bookkeeper. Because of her proximity to the man in front of her, she might have served as his secretary. It is unlikely, given the era of the photograph, that the man in front of her was her secretary!

Note the large pot-bellied stove in the center of the room. Those were the days before central heating systems were installed in offices or in homes. The stove burned wood, of course, and coal. The stove would radiate heat at least a few feet or more. If the room were closed, the stove's ability to heat the room was improved, even on the coldest days.

The woman sat before a typewriter that certainly improved her efficiency to compose and write letters and correspondence. The Chicago & Northwestern Railway covered the entire Northern Midwest, as well as states leading east and west of Chicago. Correspondence of one sort or another was needed every day. The men seated in front of her and to the side were likely engaged in other activities needed to sustain the railroad and the movement of freight from the point of pickup to the ultimate destination.

The calendar behind the woman indicates the shot was made on the ninth day of a particular month. In that the door of the stove was open, there probably was little need at that time for heat. Perhaps the month was in the early spring or later. The men in the photograph, but for one, worked in their shirtsleeves and without a jacket. A man to the left of the stove is holding something to his ear and he is wearing a suit jacket. The late 19th Century and the early 20th Century were not known as eras when men wore sport jackets to the office. It is uncertain if a man could even buy a sport jacket from a clothier in those days. But the ties the men wore look like more like the 1910s or 20s. The dress looks like a style earlier than the 1930s.

It is likely that the office workers executed their duties in a reasonably efficient manner. Zoom, email, and Internet technology were science fiction. The 1918 pandemic was close to the time of this picture. Typewriters and some archaic adding machines were likely available. The clock on the wall that registered 9:03 had to be wound daily or the office could not tell when quitting time had arrived. Certainly most, if not all of the people that worked in the Chicago & Northwestern Railway office in Belvidere were proud of their work and what they accomplished, but, little different from workers of today: Pride in the job is one thing, but when quitting time arrives, everyone needs to know!

Only Three New Laws Take Effect Jan. 1

Minimum wage increase to \$11/hour will also be in effect

When a new year begins in Illinois, there typically are dozens if not hundreds of new laws going into effect.

Not this year. Like so many other things in 2020, the legislative spring session was stunted by COVID-19. Once the global pandemic reached Illinois in March, the General Assembly would meet for only four more days — wrapping up the odd session during masked and socially distanced gatherings at the Capitol and Bank of Springfield Center. The fall veto session was scrapped altogether.

As a result, only three new laws will take effect on Jan. 1, 2021. Here's a look at them, as well as the next increase in the minimum wage that will be applied Friday:

Insulin costs cap

Senate Bill 667 (Public Act 101-0625) amends the Illinois Insurance Code to cap out-of-pocket insulin costs at \$100 per month for all patients using a state regulated insurance plan, regardless of the amount of insulin or type of covered prescription insulin drug used to fill the insured patient's prescription.

Roughly 1.3 million adults in Illinois, or 12.5 percent of the population, have diabetes, according to the legislation.

SB 667 also provides that the Illinois Department of Insurance, along with the Department of Human Services and the Department of Healthcare and Family Services, must create a public insulin pricing report that includes a summary of insulin pricing practices and public policy recommendations to control and prevent the overpricing of insulin prescriptions.

Sen. Andy Manar, D-Bunker Hill, chief sponsor of the Senate bill, said in a statement that the legislation shows Illinoisans don't have to accept costly prescriptions as the status quo.

"We can change the fact that prescription medication costs more in the United States than any place in the world. This legislation passed because people spoke up and told their story. This historic legislation doesn't become law without them and their effort," Manar said in the statement.

Use of DNA in missing person cases

House Bill 2708 (Public Act 101-0266) amends the Missing Persons Identification Act to allow law enforcement agencies to obtain a DNA sample of a missing person or a DNA reference sample from family members' DNA, once a missing person report is made.

The law also provides that law enforcement cannot retain DNA samples from family members or the missing person after the person has been located.

It also adds the National Missing and Unidentified Persons System, a national information clearinghouse for missing persons, to the list of laboratories that law enforcement agencies can work with when trying to find a missing person.

Sen. Tony Munoz, D-Chicago, who was one of the bill's sponsors, said in a news release that using the national system will hopefully help law enforcement find missing people sooner.

"Successfully finding a missing person requires law enforcement to move fast, and we want to make sure they have every tool available to do their job," Munoz said in the release.

Keeping victims' addresses confidential

House Bill 2818 (Public Act 101-0270) amends

the Address Confidentiality for Victims of Domestic Violence Act by including survivors of sexual assault and stalking in the Illinois Address Confidentiality Program (ACP), which offers survivors protection from their abusers by allowing them to acquire and use a substitute address instead of their real address.

HB 2818 allows survivors of domestic violence, sexual assault and stalking who fear for their safety to apply to the ACP through the Attorney General's Office. The ACP forwards all first-class mail and provides survivors with a substitute address for public records and documents, such as driver's licenses and state-issued identification cards.

The bill also changes the name of the law, from the Address Confidentiality for Victims of Domestic Violence Act to the Address Confidentiality for Victims of Domestic Violence, Sexual Assault or Stalking Act.

In a written statement, Illinois Attorney General Kwame Raoul said ACP is an important added layer of protection and peace of mind for survivors of domestic violence, sexual assault and stalking.

"I am committed to ensuring that survivors have access to the resources and support needed to aid their recoveries, and I encourage survivors to participate in this program that can help protect them from the individuals who perpetrated crimes against them," Raoul said in the statement.

Minimum wage increase

The minimum wage in Illinois will rise from \$10 per hour to \$11 per hour on Jan. 1.

The Illinois General Assembly passed increases to the minimum wage in 2019 with legislation that raises the minimum wage \$1 every year until it reaches \$15 per hour in 2025.

In 2020, wage earners saw their hourly wage increase from \$8.25 to \$9.25 on Jan. 1, and to \$10 on July 1.

"We want to make sure that workers earning minimum wage are aware that the \$1 increase should be reflected in their paychecks for any time they work after the first of the year," Michael Kleinik, director of the Illinois Department of Labor, said in a news release. "While we fully expect employers will pay the new wage, we also want workers to be aware of the change."

Boone County Receives First Covid-19 Vaccine Shipment

Boone County has received the first shipment of COVID-19 vaccine. The initial shipment of 500 doses received, will be used to provide vaccines to local healthcare personnel and emergency response staff. BCHD will begin administering COVID-19 vaccine this week to Boone's first priority groups.

Long-term care facilities (LTCF) are also part of Phase 1 priority and Boone County LTCF are enrolled in a Federal Program, called the Pharmacy Partnership Program. This program is a direct partnership between LTCF and pharmacies. BCHD has been told that the expected start for long-term care facility vaccinations may be as early as this week.

Additional vaccine is expected to arrive on a weekly basis. Currently, BCHD does not have a registration site for vaccines and anticipates that phase 1A will take 4-6 weeks to complete. In preparation for future populations eligible for the COVID-19 vaccine, the Health Department is working with IDPH to implement a state-wide vaccine registration and scheduling tool.

Nobody Seems to Give a Whit about Illinois

The Paul Simon Public Policy Institute at Southern Illinois University asked me to do some noodling about the future of Illinois. I have mentioned this to several friends. The responses — a roll of the eyes; a belly laugh; a retort that it is too late to do anything about Illinois. Nobody has responded that it is a good use of my time, needs to be done.

Few, it seems, give a whit about our state. Why might this be so?

In the late 19th Century, Illinois was the fastest growing state in the nation. Twenty-seven million from around the world were dazzled by the White City on Chicago's lakefront, the 1893 World Columbian Exposition. We had some swagger then, and maybe so up to the post-war period of my childhood, as synergies between city and fertile countryside made our state one of the richest. But now, we're in a funk.

There is no "Eyes of Texas Are upon You" to rally us, to bring folks out of their chairs in unison and pride. There is real sense of statehood in Texas, which we lack, maybe because Illinois isn't a natural community. We are a state of regions: Chicago, of course; the 'burbs; southern Illinois; western Illinois; and so on. When traveling overseas, we aren't "from Illinois," but more often from "near Chicago." We're not alone; many states share similar regional divisions; think of Tennessee, New York.

Illinois does have big problems: a deadbeat state government, drowning in deficits and debt. Illinois also has a reputation across the country as being one of the most corrupt states. All of which dampens interest in doing business here.

Yet Illinois has great strengths. "In each of the five critical Rs—roads, rails, runways, rivers and routers," boasts prominent Effingham entrepreneur Jim Schultz, "Illinois is in the top three among the 50 states."

In addition, Illinois has a strong system of public and private colleges and universities, especially vibrant at the graduate research institution level, critical to innovation and discovery in the future. For example, Marc Andreessen and colleagues at the University of Illinois basically invented internet web browsing, central to everyday lives the world over.

And of course, Illinois is in the middle of the nation; our goods can reach much of the nation in a day's time. Our per capita personal income is also comfortably above the national average; if our economy were that of a nation, we would rank 19th or so in the world.

Based on this, we should have some swagger. But we don't.

In addition to beating on ourselves for so long about our negatives, a self-fulfilling prophecy, we simply have never —never-ever— thought about our future. I have scoured our history, and I cannot find a single illustration of Illinois ever having done any comprehensive, long-term thinking. There is, for sure, much thinking about metropolitan Chicago, but not about the state, which has different functions from local governments.

Maybe it's because we have always practiced meat-and-potatoes politics, where elected officials focus laser-like on simply getting to next year, and getting re-elected in two. We'll worry about the future when it arrives.

Long-term thinking about a positive future doesn't, of course, make it so. Yet such a process can build goal posts to shoot for, and measure our progress as we go. This is what the impressive former Gov. Mitch Daniels famously did in Indiana, with his dashboard of key indicators, to which he held his team accountable.

We have been in a funk so long, I think our problems in Illinois are basically psychological, even more than political. We need to rally ourselves around our strengths.

One small example: Have our Illinois arts and humanities councils hold a competition among our songwriters to come up with a catchy, upbeat tune about Illinois, one we can all hum along to. "By thy rivers gently flowing. . ." just doesn't cut it. Don't laugh—sparks of life, emotion and passion drive achievement.

Second, bring together the half dozen-plus fine think tanks at our public universities and in the nonprofit sector. Have their scholars gaze out the window and brood about the problems — and potential — of the future. Set up some goal posts.

Then, recruit champions for Illinois from the top rungs of business, labor, and civic life to lead us to some swagger, once again.

We are, after all, the Land of Lincoln. We have a lot to live up to.

Gov. Pritzker at His Daily COVID-19 Briefing in Chicago on Friday, Dec. 18

Gov. JB Pritzker announced Friday the 18th that more than 17,000 doses of the first coronavirus vaccine have been administered to Illinois frontline health care workers outside of Chicago, up from 3,500 doses on Thursday.

Pritzker said Illinois hospitals could begin to receive shipments of a second COVID-19 vaccine, developed by the drug company Moderna, as early as past week. That announcement comes one day after the U.S. Food and Drug Administration's advisory committee recommended the use of the Moderna vaccine in people ages 18 and older. The FDA on Friday evening granted Emergency Use Authorization for the Moderna vaccine.

The first vaccine, developed by Pfizer and BioNTech, received such authorization from the FDA last week.

The Moderna vaccine was shown to be 94.1 percent effective after two doses four week apart, compared to the Pfizer BioNTech vaccine that was found

95 percent effective after two doses three weeks apart.

“This is yet another very exciting development, and it reinforces and it brightens the light at the end of the tunnel for all of us who have been fighting through COVID-19,” Pritzker said.

News about the vaccines comes as the state’s coronavirus death toll surpassed 15,000, rising to 15,015 among 886,805 cases and more than 12 million test results reported since the beginning of the pandemic.

On Friday, the Illinois Department of Public Health reported 7,377 new confirmed and probable cases of COVID-19 in Illinois, including 181 additional deaths.

Statewide, the rolling seven-day average case positivity rate was 8 percent, which decreased four-tenths of a percentage point from the day prior. This is the fifth straight day that the rolling seven-day average case positivity rate has decreased, and it’s the lowest rate recorded since Nov. 1.

At the end of Thursday, there were 4,690 people hospitalized with COVID-19 in Illinois, a decrease of 114 from the day prior. Approximately 25 percent of hospital beds remained open statewide.

There were 1,023 intensive care beds in use by COVID-19 patients as of Thursday night, a decrease of 40 from the day prior. That left 20 percent of ICU beds open statewide.

COVID-19 patients occupied 589 ventilators, an increase of 14 from the day prior, leaving 72 percent of ventilators available statewide.

Two of the state’s 11 mitigation regions — Region 1, which encompasses the northern and western portion of the state, and Region 6, which covers portions of eastern and central Illinois — have met the conditions laid out by the Pritzker administration to return to Tier 2 mitigations, from Tier 3, which all 11 regions entered by Nov. 20. But the governor said that does not mean existing regulations will be rolled back in the near future.

Both Region 1 and Region 6 have experienced a test positivity rate less than 12 percent for three consecutive days, had greater than 20 percent available intensive care unit and medical or surgical bed availability for three consecutive days, and saw a decline in the number of COVID-19 patients in the hospital in 7 out of the last 10 days.

Tier 3 mitigations strictly limit capacity at retail stores and other Illinois businesses and require casinos and video gambling terminals to close, among other economic restrictions, which would no longer apply in Tier 2. However, Tier 2 mitigations still prohibit indoor dining at restaurants or bars.

“First of all we’re very glad that things are moving in the right direction. We’re also concerned the numbers have not come down as precipitously as we would have liked to have seen by now. And so that’s of great concern to us. We’re still seeing 7,000, 8,000, 9,000 cases every day, and we still have a positivity rate that’s far from the (World Health Organization) recommended 5 percent,” Pritzker said in response to a question about the regions that met criteria to return to Tier 2.

Despite the regions meeting the criteria, Pritzker has said no regions will be removed from stricter mitigations at this time, and it is unclear when the rollback of mitigations may begin.

“Since the surge hit us, it’s been important for us to get the right trajectory of cases, and hospitalizations and ICU use, and to make sure that we get to the right level. Remember, there are still many hospitals around the state, that have limited ability to take in new ICU patients, or even new hospitalizations. And so we’re trying very hard to bring it down all across the state before we start to relieve the regions from Tier 3 to Tier 2.”

IDPH Director Dr. Ngozi Ezike was asked about whether the anticipated increase in COVID-19 cases and hospitalizations that was expected after the Thanksgiving holiday, due to greater numbers of people traveling and gathering, has been avoided since that spike has not yet occurred.

“I am really happy to say that we did not see the significant surge that we were very much concerned

about in relation to all the reports that we saw of the large amount of travel here in the state of Illinois,” Ezike said. “I think all the mitigations that we had in place in advance of Thanksgiving have been helpful. So, no we did not see a surge following Thanksgiving. I’m waiting for this final week’s tally, which will come on Monday, but so far that is a good thing that we can report.”

Pritzker also announced that after Friday’s news briefing, his administration will hold news conferences on “an as needed basis” instead of daily.

“I can promise that you’ll still be hearing from Dr. Ezike and me often as we provide regular updates on vaccine distribution, the status of our regions in the Restore Illinois plan and general state-wide COVID-19 trends,” Pritzker said.

Illinois Surgeon General: Numbers ‘Moving in the Right Direction’

Urges public to get vaccine, continue practicing safety measures

The top public health official in the United States said Tuesday that the COVID-19 trends in Illinois are improving and he urged the public to get vaccinated as soon as the doses become available to them.

“The numbers here in Illinois are moving in the right direction and we have a finish line in sight with these two vaccines,” U.S. Surgeon General Dr. Jerome Adams said during a news conference in Chicago.

Adams was referring to the vaccines that were recently granted Emergency Use Authorization by the U.S. Food and Drug Administration, one developed by the drug companies Pfizer and BioNTech, and another by Moderna. The state began distributing the Pfizer vaccine last week and expects to begin shipping the Moderna vaccine this week.

The major difference between the two vaccines is that the Pfizer vaccine must be stored at an ultra-low temperature of 80 below zero, whereas the Moderna vaccine can be stored at temperatures up to 20 below zero. Both have been shown to be 94 to 95 percent effective in preventing people from developing COVID-19 symptoms.

But while people are waiting for their turn to receive the vaccine, Adams urged people to continue following public health guidelines – wearing face masks in public, frequently washing hands and wip-

ing down surfaces and avoiding large gatherings.

“We can’t let fatigue let us make poor decisions this holiday season that end up making us backtrack, especially when we are so incredibly close to getting ourselves and everyone else across the finish line,” he said.

Adams was in Chicago to tour local hospitals there as they administered vaccinations and to meet with the state’s public health director, Dr. Ngozi Ezike, as well as Chicago’s public health director, Dr. Alison Arwady, to get an update about the state’s vaccination program.

Adams visited Chicago as the state’s overall infection rate continued to decline.

The Illinois Department of Public Health reported Tuesday that 6,239 new confirmed or probable cases had been diagnosed over the previous 24 hours out of 84,764 tests performed. That lowered the state’s seven-day rolling average case positivity rate to 7.4 percent, marking the third consecutive day the number was below 8 percent.

As of Monday night, 4,571 Illinoisans were reported hospitalized with COVID-19, an increase of 111 from the day before. Of those hospitalized, 981 were in intensive care units, unchanged from the day before, and 557 of those ICU patients were on ventilators, 11 more than on Sunday.


IDPH also reported 116 additional deaths over the previous 24 hours, bringing the total number of fatalities in Illinois since the pandemic began to 15,414. There have now been 911,308 cases of the disease in the state out of more than 12.6 million tests performed.

Earlier in the day, a panel of state lawmakers received a briefing on the state’s vaccination plan where they were told the state expects to receive enough vaccines by the end of the month to vaccinate all of its front-line health care workers and more than a quarter of all the residents and staff of long-term care facilities.

Those are the population groups categorized as 1A in the state’s Vaccination Planning Guide, the first people in line for the vaccine.

Andrew Friend, IDPH deputy director for the Office of Preparedness and Response, said that as of Saturday, Dec. 19, the state had received more than 109,000 doses of the Pfizer vaccine. That included 23,328 doses that were shipped directly to Chicago and 85,800 for the rest of the state.

All of those doses were distributed to hospitals, either through Regional Hospital Coordinating Centers or directly to hospitals that have the equipment to store the vaccine at ultra-low temperatures. Outside of Chicago, they were focused in the 50 counties with the highest death rates per-capita from COVID-19.



Friend estimated it would take four to six weeks to vaccinate all the 1A individuals who agree to get the vaccine. The next group, 1B, will include people age 75 and older and front-line essential workers outside of the health care industry.

After that, he said, will come group 1C, which includes people age 65 to 74 as well as people age 16-64 who have other health issues such as heart or lung disease that put them at high risk of developing serious complications from COVID-19.

Friend emphasized, however, that the length of time it takes to move through those groups will depend on several factors such as how many shipments the state actually receives and the "uptake rate" – the percentage of people within each category who elect to get the vaccine.

In Chicago, Surgeon General Adams acknowledged that many people might be skeptical or have questions about the vaccine, but he encouraged people understand the facts.

"It is perfectly OK to have questions about this vaccine," he said. "I want you to ask questions about this vaccine. What is not OK is to let misinformation lead you into making a decision which is poor for your health or for the health of your communities."

Illinois 'Sprints' to Early Lead Nationally in COVID-19 Vaccinations

More than 100,000 doses of COVID-19 vaccines have been administered in Illinois since the first vaccine was approved for emergency use this month, more than any other state in the nation, and state officials expected the pace of the vaccination program to speed up as the federal government began distributing a second drug last week.

Gov. JB Pritzker made that announcement during a virtual media briefing Wednesday, Dec. 23, adding that eventually, larger states like California and Texas will surpass Illinois simply because of the size of their populations.

"But the vaccine team in Illinois sprinted past them all in week one," Pritzker said.

The U.S. Food and Drug Administration granted Emergency Use Authorization Dec. 11 for a vaccine developed by the drug companies Pfizer and BioNTech, and the state began delivering those vaccines last week.

On Friday, Dec. 18, FDA granted the same authorization for a vaccine developed by Moderna and shipments of that vaccine are now being distributed to hospitals and local health departments throughout the state.

By Saturday, Dec. 26, Pritzker said, the state expected to receive another 23,400 doses of the Pfizer vaccine, plus 174,600 doses of the Moderna vaccine for distribution throughout Illinois outside of Chicago. In addition, Illinois is dedicating another 37,050 doses of the Pfizer vaccine for a federal government's vaccination program for long-term care facilities, which is being administered by the pharmacy

companies CVS and Walgreen's.

"And with this week's Moderna shipments, vaccines will have officially reached all 102 counties in Illinois," Pritzker said.

The city of Chicago, which receives its own shipments directly from the federal government, expected to receive 15,600 doses of the Pfizer vaccine and 48,000 doses of the Moderna vaccine last week.

All of the vaccines being distributed in the first phase of the program are earmarked for health care workers and the residents and staff of long-term care facilities. State officials said last week they expected it will take four to six weeks to complete that phase before the program expands to cover people over age 75 and other front-line essential workers.

COVID-19 UPDATE: Illinois reported its third consecutive day with more than 100 COVID-19 deaths Tuesday, Dec. 29. Meanwhile, most statistics the state uses to measure progress in combatting the coronavirus ticked up slightly.

On Tuesday, the Illinois Department of Public Health reported 5,644 new confirmed and probable cases of COVID-19 in Illinois, alongside 106 additional deaths caused by the virus.

Those deaths ranged in age from one man in his 20s to persons older than 100.

Statewide, the rolling seven-day average case positivity rate from Dec. 23 to Dec. 29 was 7.4 percent. That is two-tenths of a percentage point higher than the seven-day average case positivity rate reported Monday. The rolling seven-day case positivity rate has remained below 8 percent for 10 consecutive days.

Gov. JB Pritzker put the entire state under Tier 3 mitigations in November, which saw second-wave peaks in nearly every COVID-19 metric. The rolling case positivity rate remained above 10 percent for an entire month, from Nov. 7 to Dec. 7.

At the end of Monday, there were 4,313 people hospitalized with COVID-19 in Illinois, an increase of 70 from the previous 24 hours.

There were 904 intensive care beds in use by COVID-19 patients as of Monday night, an increase of 20 from the previous 24 hours. That left 797 ICU beds available statewide, less than 25 percent of the total.

COVID-19 patients occupied 506 ventilators as of Monday night, a decrease of 9 from the previous 24 hours. That left 4,129 ventilators, or 72.5 percent of all ventilators available for use across the state.

RESTRICTIONS REMAIN: Despite positive trends in COVID-19 statistics, Gov. JB Pritzker said Wednesday, Dec. 23, he has no immediate plans to lift the Tier 3 mitigations currently in effect statewide, which includes the closure of bars and restaurants to indoor service and strict limits on public gatherings.

"The challenge that we have is, what we don't want to do is swing back and forth between mitigations and not having mitigations within days or a week or two of one another," Pritzker said. "And as we head into the Christmas holiday and New Year's, my concern is that we might see – we are going likely to see – some uptick from Christmas and from New Year's in hospitalizations as well as cases."

"Having said that," he added, "even if we brought the entire state or specific regions from Tier 3 to Tier 2, that would not open bars and restaurants for indoor service yet. We need to bring it down even further and for a longer period of time."
